NEW EXHIBITION UNVEILS SPECULATIVE ARTWORK CREATED BY CHICAGO YOUTH HOPING FOR HEALTHIER COMMUNITIES

Chicago - Beginning Friday, January 18, *South Side Speculations*, a new exhibition showcasing historically-grounded art and speculative media, will open as part of the University of Chicago's Arts + Public Life exhibition program at the Arts Incubator in Washington Park. *South Side Speculations* features objects created by local young people, exhibiting what is possible when young people investigate their neighborhoods' histories and imagine how to build healthier and freer futures.

Led by the University of Chicago's Center for Interdisciplinary Inquiry and Innovation in Sexual and Reproductive Health (Ci3) Transmedia Story Lab and University of Illinois at Chicago's History Moves, South Side Speculations grew out of Transmedia Collage, a two-year intergenerational program made up of Chicago-based high school students, arts and humanities scholars, and practicing artists and storytellers. Funded by the Andrew W. Mellon Foundation's Humanities Without Wall Consortium based at the Illinois Program for Research in the Humanities at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign, and led by professors Jennifer Brier and Patrick Jagoda, Transmedia Collage collaborated with 23 young people during the 2017 and 2018 summers to explore the impact of structural violence on health and wellness across the South Side. This program was designed with a particular focus on the historic Englewood, Greater Grand Crossing, North Lawndale, Washington Park, and Woodlawn communities and many of the participants either currently live or were born and raised in these communities.

The program included a series of summer workshops hosted on the University of Chicago's campus. In the first year, youth participants were introduced to historical research and oral history interviewing skills and interviewed community elders who grew up in their communities. These students created a variety of collages that reimagined the past of their neighborhoods and incorporated the historical research they completed over the summer. In the second year, youth were asked to imagine the futures in which they wish to live. The objects from year two were designed to be speculative in nature and were influenced by science fiction and Afrofuturism that the group studied together; capturing the dreams, beliefs, and imagination that the residents from their communities might hold.

By detailing how a climate of structural violence has impacted the health and wellbeing of young people of color on Chicago's South Side, as well as the adults who grew up in these communities, the exhibition features objects that examine the past, present, and future of South Side neighborhoods. It also details the complex social determinants of health in an ever-state of policing.

"It was an honor to work alongside a group of talented, intelligent, and imaginative young people from Chicago's South Side," said Dr. Patrick Jagoda, Co-Founder of Transmedia Story Lab and Associate Professor of Cinema & Media Studies and English at UChicago. "Over the last two years, they have expressed deep excitement to study the histories of their communities, and real vision in imagining more just futures and creating models of healthier neighborhoods."

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Hosted by University of Chicago's Arts + Public Life, the exhibition's opening reception will be held on Friday, January 18, 2019 from 6 - 8 p.m. at the University of Chicago's Arts Incubator, 301 E Garfield Blvd, Chicago, IL 60637. It is free and open to the public.

The showcase will continue to run at the Arts Incubator from January 19 – March 1, 2019.
